
COLOURING (June demonstration)



Peter Clemett colouring demonstration June 2014 This demonstration was very timely as the next meeting in July is the first competition for the new Peter Hutchinson trophy. So why colour?, well Peter posed the question and there are many answers, it will enhance the project if you have a bland wood, it could help the design or the project could be designed around the decorations. You maybe want to disguise the fact that you are using wood, or not using wood! The best results are generally obtained if you plan before hand to use decorations / painting / embelishments. Peter prepared several wooden bases with white and green paint and showed us his tubes of cheap acrylic paints. Artists colours, as opposed to Student colours, generally have denser and more durable pigments. Some dobs of paint were put onto a platter and a piece of a wet car sponge was put onto the paint and then gently dobbed lightly onto a green painted base. Alternatively, a sea sponge can be used to give a more random effect. Several colours were done in this fashion and a hair drier was used to dry the paint in some cases. This was done until the desired effect was obtained and then the job is sprayed with a clear enamel spray to enhance the look and protect the surface. Someone in the audience suggested using a seagulls feather to achieve a veined granite/marble look. Metalic or iridescent paints can also be used.

Peter then moved on to using an air brush for spray painting. He showed us his air brush which has a double action lever for cotrolling the flow of paint and the flow of air, this unit using about 25 p.s.i. air pressure. He uses the 'Golden' brand of pre mixed paints. Peter set up a white blank doing slow revs in the lathe and sprayed an opaque red on the outer areas, followed by a transparent yellow. The air brush and resevoir must be thoroughly cleaned between colours...Peter then pulled of a cut maple leaf from a sheet of special Frisket masking film (plastic) and stuck the outer part of the sheet onto the blank like a stencil. The maple leaf shape was then sprayed with two shades of green, which made it stand out from the red and yellow background.He suggested that most artist supplies can be bought at Gordon Harris Supplies in Southwark Street.

Turning Over the Ditch by Danny Brooks

It was with a heavy heart that I left Christchurch and the woodturning club at the end of 2013. It was here that I'd bought a lathe and chisels, turned my first bowls and pens, and um, hadn't progressed much beyond that, actually. But it was such a lot of fun.

The mentors with their open sheds, the regular and varied club nights, whether you wanted to stand around in the Cobham workshop or blend in and learn from an expert in the uni classroom.



Much of what I had enjoyed happened outside of regular meetings. Visiting turners in their sheds and lounge rooms, getting a lesson from Rex in the sunshine or dropping in for a quick stop but talking long with Bruce and Celia. Getting to know so many of the club members and marveling at what they could do, and were willing to share and pass on – time, skills and occasionally some wood.

Last Christmas, we pulled up stumps when another house failed to show itself after a couple of years and Brooklands' demise. I regret leaving the wood behind – I should have painted or oiled it and put it in the container. I miss the kauri and the yew – both fairly thin on the ground here.

But we've landed on our feet, and God has been good to us. We both enjoy teaching at the same school, my alma mater, and I'm loving how it has changed over a couple of decades yet has kept some character.

The locals are friendly, and a few of them are old Kiwis. One tip led to us stumbling on to a couple of pallets of milled Tasmanian blackwood, Vic ash, jarrah and so on in a timber warehouse that was closing down. That took the sting out of leaving the kauri on the far bank of the Tasman.

I'm delighted to be around my family and am spending most of my spare time catching up with my parents, plus two brothers and their families: the novelty is yet to wear off, for me at least. My nephews have enjoyed getting their hands on some pyrography in their grandfather's shed, the tidying of which – to allow for this kind of fun – has been a major project since my return.

I've joined a local turning club, Eastern Woodturners. They are hard to find on the web, but you might catch a glimpse on the website of their Wandin HQ, *Mont de Lancey*. It's an historic homestead which hosts plenty of tour groups, and the club has a smallish but well-equipped shed on site. Club members open up and demonstrate for touring school groups and on open days, and any pair of members can drop in a couple of days a week and turn. When I find some spare time.

I've discovered that plain old gum trees can hide some beautiful timber. My brother felled an anonymous old backyard eucalypt a few years ago, and I was pleased to find my first bit of Aussie wood had a rich pink heart surrounded by rich rimu brown colour and figure. It turns out to be southern mahogany – lots of the gums are named for other trees, like Tassie oak and mountain ash.

So, the wood-scrounging continues to build up the collection. There's 25 fellas to get to know at the new club. As always, the battle for spare time to turn goes on. Life is good and I hope to pop into Christchurch again sometime soon – maybe when it's topping 40 degrees here, but you've got a liveable 25, and rivers worth swimming in. I'll try to time it for the first Thursday of the month.

CELTIC KNOTS MADE EASY (July Demonstration)

Following Sorens critique of the show table pieces, Noel stressed the need for the club to do better with the finish on our pieces....

Noel had a tenon saw set up to cut 45 degrees in a stand and did a cut through a 25mm square section blank ,but not cutting through the last 2mm. The blank was double ended which also makes it easier to hold. He then cut two squares of a black vaneer and pushed them together into the cut, before super glueing all around the vaneer pieces. The opposite side of the blank was also similarly cut and glued. Noel then produced a completed blank and mounted it on a pen mandrel and proceeded to turn the blank down to about 20mm dia, before re glueing the inserts. It was then turned down to about 15mm. dia. and shaped to suit, before sanding down through the grades. For a finish, wax's are not good for pens due to the constant handling. Noel said he would usually rub on super glue by hand as a sealer. He then rubbed on the Triple EEE as an undercoat, followed by two coats of a GLOW polish., which pretty much finished the demonstration. Celtic knots done by Rex and Rick were also shown as examples. National Association of Woodworkers NZ Membership

As a member of an affiliated club you can become a member of the NAW for \$45 a year.

Every individual member receives a copy of our popular national magazine, Creative Wood, four times a year. This is packed with informative shared experiences and ideas and articles on forthcoming and past events around the country (and overseas), project ideas and instructions, tool and machinery reviews and hints, book reviews, historical information, and other inspirational items, as well as NAW member notices and details of NAW member clubs.

Every NAW member club also receives a copy (usually placed in the club library). Contributions from members are welcomed, subject to overall editorial oversight of the Editor.

The NAW coordinates demonstrator tours around the country, with costs shared across all participating clubs. The aim is to break even, but the NAW underwrites any losses, making a modest excess on some tours to off-set losses on others.

These demonstrators are almost always professionals, many being internationally recognised. Such demonstrators take time out of their workshops from what they do for a living, and what they charge is a modest return for their time away from home.

Every individual NAW member receives a membership card. When an individual NAW Member attends an NAW-sponsored touring demonstration that Member receives a discount in recognition of their individual NAW membership.

Members need to produce their NAW membership cards to obtain this discount. Typically, this is a \$5 discount off the general demonstration, Master Class and Master Class observer attendance fees.

As well as giving you affordable and discounted access through demonstrations and tutorials, to top overseas and New Zealand teachers, there are many inter-club events in the NAW calendar that give members an opportunity to mix socially and to trade ideas and techniques. This is especially true of participatory events.

NAW monogrammed polo shirts, poly fleece jackets and caps can be purchased at competitive prices through the NAW website. Obtaining and wearing this clothing enables members to show their pride in the NAW.

Members have access to the NAW Education Opportunity Grants Programme, typically to help with expenses for traveling, tuition and workshops. As a member of NAW you are not only part of the active woodskills community in New Zealand but you also have access to the worldwide woodturning and woodcrafting community.

Tedge's Wholemeal Chocolate Caramel Slice

(this is a double mixture) as requested after its success at the Fun Day

Crunchy base:

150a butter

4 tablespoons brown sugar

2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

120g white flour

120g stoneground wholemeal flour

Topping:

140g dark chocolate

25g butter

Filling:

240g butter

100g brown sugar

4 tablespoons golden syrup

1 can sweetened condensed milk (395-400g)

1 teaspoon vanilla essence

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Base: cream butter & sugar. Mix flours & cinnamon & add. Mix till combined. Press mixture into a lined 20 x 30cm tin. Bake about 20 minutes till golden brown. Cool while you make the filling.

Filling: Put butter, sugar, syrup & condensed milk into a heavy based saucepan, stir over a low heat to dissolve. Slowly bring to the boil, stirring all the time, & cook, for about 6-7 minutes until thick. Stir mixture all the time & try not to burn it!

Remove from the element, beat in the cinnamon & vanilla essence. Spread filling over the base. Cool to room temperature then put it in the fridge.

Topping: melt chocolate & butter together, 1-2 minutes in the microwave, or in a bowl over a saucepan of hot water. Spread over the cooled caramel filling.

When set, cut into small pieces.

Eat. Enjoy. Share with friends.
