Demonstration Report

October Meeting: Inside-Outside Turning with Peter


Peter started by explaining the different approaches that could be taken in preparing the work to be turned. The work to be turned can be made up of simple, square or diamond shaped components. Important that they fit together well so that after the outside is turned, the components can be reversed and will fit together well. Various options for holding the components together were elastic bands, taping etc., the simplest being paper and glue joints.

For turning between centres, Peter recommended using cup centres on the lathe as they don't tend to force the components apart and are tolerant of catches.

Before turning, draw a plan of the inside profile as that is the first profile to be turned. If it is intended to have an insert contained within the final product you have to consider that at this stage as well to ensure there is enough space and provision for mounting. A drawing of the outside profile completes the preparatory work.

Once the initial turning is completed, the components are split apart, reversed and glued together, ready for the final turning.

Peter referred to some notes that were available on the topic. The author is Glenn Karcher of the West Bay Woodturners, California.

The event will take place at the Workshop from the evening of Friday 28th to afternoon of Sunday 30th January, 2022. The theme will be "Illumination".



The trophies are:

Jim Dunford Memorial Trophy – To be awarded this year to the best piece that is a composite of 2 or more dissimilar materials. It could be wood and stone, resin and flax, pewter and wood, stone and plastic, wood and Milliput, or any other combination.



General Rules for the 2021 Competitions:

- Date of Competition Club night, 24 November 2021
- Entrants must be financial members of the Club at the time of the Competition.
- Only one entry per member. Work must be the member's own.
- A work may be either a single item or consist of multiple related parts.
- At least some aspect of the work must have been turned on a lathe.
- Work must have been completed in the past year.
- Judges will be appointed by the Committee. The judge's decision is final.

PYROGRAPHY


One of our newer members turned up to the pyrography group meeting this month with an older model Delta pokerwork unit recently purchased off TradeMe. Similar to the one illustrated below (available from Timberly), the machine was picked up for a bargain price and is in a very tidy condition.



These Delta units are made in New Zealand and are a very popular tool in school technology classrooms. The unit features a single handpiece which features replaceable wire tips and can be operated on one of three fixed heat settings. With a few additions and an understanding of its limitations it is capable of a wide range of wood burning effects. It will be a great tool to learn on and I expect it will give many years of good service. My recommendations to add to its functionality were:

Firstly, a small selection of new tips to allow basic drawing, shading, and texturing operations to be undertaken with ease. Pre-made tips can be purchased, however a few dollars for a length of 20 gauge nickel-chromium wire and a few minutes spent bending and shaping delivers a much quicker and

cheaper result. The wire forms easily into the required shapes under the influence of handheld pliers, light hammer "forging" and a fine file. In short order we had three new tips to try out — a round end writing/texturing tip, a knife end tip for drawing fine lines, and a flat shader. The picture sequence below shows forming of the knife end tip.







Secondly, to upgrade the unit to allow fully variable temperature control. The preset heat settings are fine to be getting started, but the constraints of these quickly become apparent as soon as you start changing tips, working with a variety of wood species, or want to produce more controlled burning effects. Fortunately, the upgrade is straightforward to achieve with the addition of an inline switch and light dimmer which a qualified electrician will be able to select and safely wire up for you. WARNING: Dimmers are not all the same or interchangeable in this application. You must only use one which is compatible with the power supply in the pokerwork machine.
