Covid – Keeping Safe



Competitions

You are all invited to make an entry for the two competitions that will be judged at our November meeting,

Peter Hutchison Trophy. A trophy in Peter's name is awarded annually to the member who displays the best coloured and / or embellished work. The scope of Colouring and/or Embellishing includes, but is not necessarily limited to one or more of; paint; dye, carving, burning, pyrography and incorporation of other materials etc.. The judges will be specifically looking for how colour has been used to enhance the work.

Jim Dunford Memorial Trophy. The Jim Dunford Trophy Competition will also be judged at our November meeting. The competition theme for this year is **Anything with a lid**.

That is, anything that has an enclosed space within it. Peter demonstrated the making of acorn boxes. Mark has shown you needle cases. Fountain pens have lids or caps, urns have lids, bird nesting boxes have lids, lids that snap on, screw on, open by pressing the edge etc...

Workshop sessions

Salt & Pepper Day, 27 August - Report by Mark Teeboon

Saturday August 27th was our Week 4 extra workshop and attended by 8 very eager woodturners ready to make a lovely salt and pepper compendium. The objective was to make a pepper grinder and a salt shaker that matched in size and shape.

A variety of timbers were on offer kindly provided by Noel and were already cut to length and width to get the project started. After a demonstration of the technique and how to, we were let loose on our first blank to start turning, shaping and drilling to get the desired result on the pepper grinder.

Lunch time break and then on to the salt shaker. This required a slightly

different technique as there was no mechanism required but the top angle had to allow the salt to flow and not clog around the hole.

It was great to see the final results in the different timbers. Not all participants finished so another job to work on at home but we left with all the necessary knowledge to confidently finish the job.

Thank you Noel for another great class and for preparing and cutting matching blanks ready for us to turn.



Another great workshop thanks to Noel, 5 participants playing with 4 methods of colouring wood.

The first method was using Lime Wax on an open grain but uninteresting timber but with the wax it was brought to life and popped, I didn't manage to get a photo of that one.

The next 3 methods required a turned bowl, 2 with oval tops to accept colour and the third a hollowed out bowl to airbrush.





The first bowl was to be marbled, the technique used was different to that taught in other clubs and was

much easier as the method didn't require prior preparation of the wood. After a coat of a solid colour the water was prepared to dip the piece into swirling water with paint floating on the surface and lifted out with a twist of the wrist to help the movement. You will see looking at the pictures we achieved a range of interesting and unique effects.

The second domed bowl also had a solid colour applied but once dry was spun on the lathe flat out and sprayed with 3 to 4 different colours with a sporadic splattered effect and again the designs are all quite different although we all seemed to have a passion for purple.

After lunch it was time to do some airbrushing which was quite new to me, we had all turned a dome in the bottom of our bowls to change the shape slightly and with the aid of the air compressor applied several different colours, again the effects achieved were all quite different.



An enjoyable day learning a couple of technics that need specialised kit that isn't in the average workshop, thank you Noel for your tutelage and preparation of equipment and timber for the class.

This is always a very popular workshop and the last two times we have had to turn people away. You can bring your own kits or purchase some on the day. Bring your own pen blanks but some will available if you don't have any.

- Sand paper
- Super glue
- Instruction sheet for your kit if it isn't a slim line or cigar & amp

 Rattles for Christchurch Hospital See this note on making a rattle from past Life Member Rex Marshall Baby rattle PDF When making rattles, be careful not to put seeds, beans, etc. in them as they may be confiscated at the border if you take them overseas. Nuts and bolts would be ideal. The



suggested rattle design does not have captive rings as they can break and be a choking hazard.



What Do You See In A Tree?

Do you aim to get the biggest bowl you can out the piece of timber in front of you? Do you care where in the tree the wood has been sourced from?

Timber is not a homogenous medium and choosing where to source timber for your project is part of the design process.

Grain orientation, figure such as at the intersection of branch and trunk, and the contrast between heartwood and sapwood can all add to the special character and impact of your piece.

Equally, inappropriate selection can detract from the effect you are trying to achieve.

Wig stands

Noel Graham gave us a demonstration in the making of wig stands. Noel made the point that there is no single spec for a wig stand, having a variety of sizes for adults and children, short and long wigs are ideal.

Keith did go on to demonstrate that his singing top did actually sing.


















WAITAKI WOODTURNERS GUILD SPIN AROUND 2022
