Embellishment session Wednesday 9 October - Cancelled but read on

The Pyrography group meetings in their current form have run their course and have ceased to operate as-is.

Instead of just one finishing technique we wish to open this session up to multiple finishing or embellishment techniques.

Some of the embellishment techniques are Kolrosing <u>Beginners Guide to Kolrosing (youtube.com)</u>, and chip carving https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=eB45kteiRtU, just to name two additions. There are other techniques such as decoupage (covering with your favourite papers), or drawing on your finished piece with paints, watercolour pencils etc., engraving with a Dremel (or similar tool), or even painting or staining your finished item. There is also stencilling, transferring images and many other ways to embellish your turned piece. Your imagination is the only limit to what you can do.

The proposed embellishment session is to be set up for you and by you, the members. If you have a finishing idea, then please get hold of Dee Morgan and let her know. It would be great to have a list of members who are willing to take a session or two on Embellishment Techniques. The workshop would be open for this new session on every second Wednesday evening from 7.00 to 9.00pm.

The raffle prize – Ray Hall

According to Wikipedia, "Inkwells gradually fell out of use in the early part of 20th century as the reservoir fountain pen (which needs to be filled only occasionally) replaced the dip pen, which needed to be dipped in ink after writing a few lines. Old school desks had round holes for inkwells."

Why am I telling you this? Well my recollection of the date differs from that quote. In 1955/6 I was appointed ink monitor at my primary school, responsible for making the ink and filling up the inkwells in each desk. Later I did have a refillable fountain pen but the advent of Biros in 1943 and BIC in 1950 hastened societies move from inkwells, bottles of ink and fountain pens. An unheralded side effect is that the Biros, BICs etc.. are now considered throw away items contributing to our mountains of waste.


So back to the raffle prize which I won at the NAW Wood Expo. It was a kit to make a JR. Gentleman I fountain pen with gold plating \$12. I have previously written in Splinters that I can understand the attraction of pen kits but they do not appeal to me from a woodturning perspective. So the kit languished in the boot of my car while I focussed on more personal matters.

I did start looking at the kit again and found some instructions for a later model on the Native Pens website. I soon realised that the kit had significant differences from the last ballpoint kit I had made. The JR. Gentlemans II fountain pen with gold plating requires 10.5mm and 31/64" drill bits and the JR Gentlemans Bushings to suit a 1/4" mandrel. I managed to find a drill bit near enough to 31/64" and made some bushings to suit the 1/4" mandrel and larger tube size. Careful use of the disc sander trued the ends of the blanks, the turning was straightforward and CA was applied and then sanded back to a matt finish. A vice was used to assemble the components and here is the finished pen.



The fountain pen is nice to use and writes with slight variations in line thickness. On the negative side it weighs 34gm. compared to 9gm. for my all wood and refill ballpoint and I have yet to find a local supplier of the refill cartridges.

Mark Your Diary – 28th September South Island Interclub Fun Day

Harvard Community Lounge, Corsair Drive, Wigram

Once again, our Club will be hosting this annual event to which all South Island Clubs are invited. The emphasis is on participation — taking part, having fun, renewing old friendships and making new ones. Like previous Fun Day events, the programme will feature team turning and Club show tables. A light lunch will be provided and in the afternoon it's your turn to relax and be entertained.

Bring plenty of spare change for the raffle, and of course check out Owen Woodturning Supplies for that new tool or to stock up on those turning essentials. Join a team for the team-turning competition or enter a piece for the Club show table.

Rules – Team Turning Competition

- The competition item is a Gavel (hammer) and Block, where the gavel is to have a separately turned head and handle. The aim is for each team to produce two identical sets. In the event of a tie, the winner will be the team judged to have the sets with the most pleasing appearance.
- Each Club team to consist of 6 persons, divided into three pairs of turners. We can enter more than one team, so everyone is welcome if they want to take part.
- Each turning pair will have 35 minutes to make two of the same component, without the use of any marking or measuring aids (rulers, callipers, pens, pencils), or sandpaper.
- The order of turning will be (1) Heads, (2) Handles, (3) Blocks
- All wood will be supplied as follows:
 - Head blanks, nominally 55 x 55 x 150mm. A 12mm hole will be drilled in the centre of one side of the blank to allow a push-fit for the handle
 - Handle blanks, nominally 30 x 30 x 250mm
 - O Block blanks, nominally 100 x 100 x 40mm

Rules – Table Competition

This is our opportunity to show off what members of our Club can accomplish. We will be competing for best Club Table, and all pieces are eligible for the Best Individual Piece award.

- 10 competition pieces allowed per table. Pieces consisting of matching pairs or sets of items will count as one piece.
- All items should be turned or at least include a significant turned element
- Only one item per person, made wholly by that person, turned in the last year, and should not have been entered in any other competition.
- Clubs can decide a theme for their own table and are encouraged to decorate their table accordingly.

August club meeting – report by Mary Clay

On the 28th August was our club monthly meeting, and we were treated to a demonstration by Peter Clemett on how to turn the items chosen for the turning competition part of the Interclub Fun Day which is to be held at the Harvard Community Lounge in Wigram, on Saturday the 28th of September.

Peter started by explaining the rules of the turning event, in which teams of turners from different clubs compete to turn matching sets of items. This year's item is a block and gavel. On the Fun Day, no measuring tools are permitted, nor any pencils, and there is a time limit, making the task complicated!

Peter reiterated that turners of all abilities should enter a

team, noting that the turners that create the first item, have a slightly easier job, as they have no need to ensure that their turning matches another!



Peter explained that turning would be judged on flair as well as accuracy of matching, so that while it was important that items matched, that everything else being equal, that the piece exhibiting better design qualities would be more likely to win. Therefore, the turner turning the first component must be careful to turn an item that is as easy as possible for the next turner to replicate, whilst considering design flair, in the tight time allowed.

Peter started by turning a gavel head - setting it up between centres, and suggested that you can put a spigot on one end if you wish. He then turned the piece round, created setout lines with the skew or a parting tool, to enable the turner to create as even a piece as possible. He then used a spindle gouge to shape the gavel head and to decorate - in a way that enables replication. He finally used a parting tool to reduce the size of the piece beyond the gavel, and used a saw to cut off the gavel head from the rest of the wood.

Peter took approximately 10 mins to turn the gavel head.





Peter then turned the gavel handle, - again between centres, and made the piece thinner at one end to match the handle to the hole in the gavel head. He used the diameter of the woodfast drive centre (1/2 inch) and made the gavel handle similar to that. He made sure to taper the end to allow it to fit into the head. He then used a skew and parting tool to mark the end and features of the handle, and proceeded to include defining features to assist with matching the piece to the second handle turned by your team. He noted that v grooves are perhaps easier to match than chamfers and that coves are also difficult to accurately match under time pressure.





Peter then turned the block using 100mm jaws. These were used so that when you turn the top

decoration, you can fit the top back into the jaws to complete the work. Peter firstly found the centre on the rough side, and used that side to bring the tailstock up to — with the smoother side facing the jaws, ensuring it was tight - friction drive. He was then cautious with speed until it was round, and created an 85mm spigot, being careful as the block was only slightly larger than the jaw diameter. He then created a shape that was easy to replicate, aesthetically pleasing, and allowed for turning over for finishing.

It was an excellent demonstration for all, whether or not one was planning on attending the fun day. It was interesting to hear the explanations given for design choice and methodology, and to ponder how quickly one could create the forms required.



Thanks Peter! - The Interclub Fun Day promises to provide plenty of challenges for all!
